## "The Landlady" Point of View Analysis

Determine why Dahl chose the 3<sup>rd</sup> person limited point of view that he did for "The Landlady." First determine why he may have chosen NOT to use certain perspectives.

- -If he'd chosen 3<sup>rd</sup> person omniscient:
  - What more could the narrator know/tell the reader?
  - In a **single** word (for example: humor, romance, excitement, etc.) What would the story lose as a result of that additional knowledge?
  - Why would it lose that due to the additional knowledge of the narrator?
- -If he'd chosen 1st person:
  - What more could the narrator know/tell the reader?
  - In a **single** word (for example: humor, romance, excitement, etc.) What would the story lose as a result of that additional knowledge?
  - Why would it lose that due to the additional knowledge of the narrator?

Now determine why he did ultimately decide to use the point of view that he did.

- -3<sup>rd</sup> person limited:
  - What does the story gain from using this perspective? ? (Helpful tip: Think of the gains as being the things it didn't lose. For example, if I do A but lose X, or if I do B but lose Y, by doing C, I ultimately "gain" X and Y by not losing them. As a result, this should be a **one to two word** answer.)
  - How/why does 3<sup>rd</sup> person limited help to create this gain?
  - Find and write a quote of narration in the story (NOT dialogue alone) that shows the point of view of 3<sup>rd</sup> person limited. Be sure to cite the quote correctly.
  - Explain how this quote shows the "gain/gains" that you said 3<sup>rd</sup> person limited creates.
